

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

This is a one story vernacular cottage consisting of two gabled rectangles 16 x 34 next to 18 x 46. The main entry is on the east side under an open porch. The exterior is clad in cedar shingle with white trim.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

The original chicken brood house was constructed in South Duxbury about 1930, and moved by Fred Bass after World War II to the Lorenzo Gifford farm, formerly the Kleinschmidt property (1898-1919) and before that the Bodge Farm of 200 acres extending to Grigson's and Run Ponds. It faced south onto former Hog Alley (for the Gifford piggery), renamed Lovell's Lane. This farm building was on 119 acres sold by Gifford to George P. Hadley for the Clear Lake Duck Farm. In 1943 Clear Lake sold a lot of about .8 acre with 163 feet frontage on Lovell's Lane, including the Davis house (see #266) and the chicken coop. It was sold to Alfred "Fred" R. Davis (1879-1956), an employee of the duck farm. In 1957 his widow Lydia May White Davis (1881-1976) subdivided the lot (Plan 137/68), sold this house on the west lot #2 to Alfred G. and Laura G. Austin of Vallejo CA. In 1978 Alfred Austin's heirs sold it to the present owner, Lucille Hausmann and her husband William P.R. Hausmann, a Schenectady architect. In 1981 they had Gary Sylvester make a 18 x 24 addition of two rooms at the rear. In 1986 the Hausmanns paid \$3.856 for 10,282 sq. feet of land to the west to construct a garage. It was bought from the Town of Barnstable which had taken it for delinquent taxes of Carl Nilsen, who had bought 5.6 acres from the Indian Lakes developers. In 1989 they built a two car garage with a second story studio for an estimated cost of \$12,000. After William's death in 1992 his widow continued to summer here.
